

3 Convicts' 'Love Life' Financed By State, Malinski Jury Is Told

Witnesses Against Alleged Cop Killer Went Romantic in Big Way, Sleuth Testifies

A jury in Kings County Court today awaited further revelations in an amazing tale of love on a dole—with the District Attorney's office picking up the check for expenses incurred by three convicts in their pursuit of sweet romance.

The pampered trio—permitted to visit their wives and sweethearts, sojourn at a borough hotel, and ride around in a rented car with hired chauffeur—were key prosecution witnesses in the first trial of Morris Malinski of 714 Hinsdale St. for the murder of Patrolman Leon Fox in 1942.

The treatment given the convict witnesses was brought out yesterday during cross-examination by Joseph A. Solovei, counsel for Malinski in his second trial for the slaying. Malinski was convicted with two other men in 1943, but the convictions were reversed, the other men released, and Malinski is being retried.

Tells of Convict's Romance

During approximately two years of appeals, the three convict witnesses, Nathan Spielfogel, David Yellin and Sam Kovner, who had been brought down from Sing Sing to testify for the State, were kept in Brooklyn.

That the three men could hardly be described as hardship cases during their stay here was brought out in the testimony of James A. Bell, a detective on the District Attorney's staff.

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U. N. IS READY TO ACT TODAY AGAINST FRANCO

U. S. Set to Join 8 Nations on Compromise Formula of Council

U. N. Headquarters, June 18 (U.P.)—The United Nations Security Council neared action today on a majority-backed plan for measures against Franco Spain which are too far-reaching in the British view and not nearly strong enough to suit Russia.

Nine Council members, including the United States, are ready to vote for a compromise formula asking the U. N. General Assembly to take appropriate steps—including as one possibility a mass diplomatic break with Spain—if Franco is still in power by September.
