Washington, April 8 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Jonathan M. Wright's hard-pressed Bataan troops have made a general withdrawal to a "previously prepared defense position" following an incessant Japanese onslaught from the air, land and sea, the War Department announced today.

The withdrawal marked the first time that the U. S. Filipino defenders had been forced to give substantial ground under the impact of the all-out drive launched by Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita's forces.

### Stagger Plan to Ease Rushes Starts Apr. 20

A voluntary plan to stagger office workers hours in Brooklyn and Manhattan will go into effect April 20, according to George A. Rosen, commissioner of the New York Department of Commerce.  
The purpose of the scheme is to level off the peaks of the transportation rush at 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. by having some workers report to work an hour earlier than at present. It is partly a wartime measure to ease the congestion of people in the event of an attack.  
**Warns of City Action**  
"Declaring that many firms have agreed to the plan with effect," Rosen stated that there must be active cooperation in the plan if mandatory regulations are to be avoided.  
"The crowded condition in the subway between 8:30 and 9 a. m. and from 3 to 3:30 p. m. has become intolerable," said Mr. Rosen. "It is being gradually corrected by voluntary action, the city will be obliged to consider regulatory measures in the interest of public health and safety.
